Poverty and lack of opportunities in the land pushed our people to go to other nations where they could earn decent living to augment their families' need. The state of poverty is best seen by the number of people who leave the country to sacrifice their lives for the future of their families. The Philippines boasts of the biggest number of people scattered across the nations — in land and in sea. They were given recognition by our government as our present-day heroes, better known with the famous term OFW's or Overseas Filipino Workers.

Statistics say that up to 3,300 Filipinos depart from the country every day. Approximately 10% of these are born-again Christians. Imagine hundreds of Global Pinoys catapulted daily as blessings to the nations of the world! But this can only happen when the Christians in our land, who are preparing to leave for employment abroad, are trained and equipped to become global missionaries embracing the purpose and title - tentmakers.

GLOBAL TENTMAKER SEMINAR NARRATIVE

A missionary who served in China for over a year sought counsel for an issue that has greatly troubled her. Her crackling voice and the welling tears from her eyes clearly

reflect the bottled pain inside her heart. No one could have guessed what was tormenting her. It was guilt for being blessed!

This is how it started. On her first months in the mission field, she got a job that paid her very good salary and a fancy condominium unit to stay in. She didn't feel completely happy though for she felt that it was wrong for a missionary to be engaged in work. So, she tried her very best to hide it from everybody but her feeling of guilt grew even stronger. The story may sound like a joke, but it is far from it. The counsel given though sounded more like one. She was told "You seem to have fallen easily to the trap of the enemy. Let's pray for you to be restored."

In Thailand, an OFW who started a church in Bangkok confided that he still feels embarrassed when his members address him as a pastor. He felt that way because he left his country to look for employment opportunities and not for ministry. But since he is so used to bringing people to the Lord, he found himself doing it in his place of work. He led many to the Lord and, from his perspective, "accidentally" planted a church where he served as the pastor. He continues to view himself though as unbecoming and unworthy of the title, for the simple reason that he is gainfully employed.

The two stories clearly indicate the lack of understanding of Tentmaking - a valuable mission platform that have been embraced by believers since the time of Apostle Paul. The Tentmakers mission training intends to introduce and educate the believers on the rightful place of job employment and business in the mission ministry. It aims to provide practical and straight-forward information on the topic. The whole presentation is in a question-and-answer format to directly address the issues that are often raised up by missionaries.

All country's immigration policies are tightening up on the old practice of same day cross border trips simply to renew visas.
